Our training division has also raised the bar this year. Several of our members have obtained new certifications, including:

#### 2023 ACCOMPLISHMENTS



- Renewed a 3-year contract with Paramedic Services of Illinois, Inc. (PSI) that includes competitive wages, annual salary increases for retention, annual physicals, and uniforms for our members.
- Hired a full-time Deputy Chief of Operations within the PSI staffing contract.
- Purchased a new command vehicle for the Deputy Chief of Operations.
- Dispatching services changed from Mercy Rock Com to the Winnebago County 911 Center, improving our response times, increasing safety, and gaining more ISO credit, all without increasing expenses.
- Completed the elevator safety program with the Office of the State Fire Marshall, giving us the ability to control all elevator inspections in the City, and giving the City a new source of revenue.
- Started utilizing Flow MSP Pre-Planning software to efficiently pre-plan commercial structures throughout the city, which significantly increases safety and enhances interoperability with outside agencies.
- Implemented a new response policy, adding a Quick Response Vehicle or QRV. The QRV responds to all medical incidents in place of the engine or quint, reducing wear and tear on our large apparatus and saving on repairs.
- Implemented an updated department policy and procedure manual through an agreement with Lexipol, a professional risk management company. These new policies and procedures ensure that our department meets and/or exceeds the standards set forth by NFPA, OSHA, etc.
- Implemented a Community Risk Reduction program, ensuring all commercial occupancies are inspected annually and risks are identified throughout the community that can be mitigated.
- Ordered a replacement breathing air compressor and cascade for station 2.
- Increase in call volume.



Jake Altenbernd was promoted from FF/PM to the Gold Shift Captain following Chief LeClair's promotion.




Kara Nelson was promoted from FF/PM to the Captain of Inspections and Prevention after Captain Adam Kuehl returned to shift.





The Loves Park Fire Department Inspections and Prevention Bureau led by Captain Kara Nelson had a very busy and productive year. We are committed to ensuring our community is a safe place to live and do business. Captain Nelson took ownership of this by ending the year with over 1,000 inspections, events, preplans, etc.

With the restrictions of COVID-19 coming to an end this year, Captain Nelson was able to get us back into local schools for drills, fire prevention education, and other public relations events. It was a pleasure to get back out into the community. This gives us the ability to meet community members and build relationships during planned events, not just during an emergency. We are looking forward to another great year in 2024.



FlowMSP gives us the ability to plan ahead, making us much more prepared for emergencies. This not only makes us more efficient and prepared but will also give us additional credit towards our ISO rating in the future.

Below are two examples of aerial images that we will see on our way to an incident involving a building we have pre-planned. This software also displays the construction type, occupancy type, needed fire flows, hydrant locations with flow rates, known hazards, contact information, etc. This is an invaluable tool in the event of a large incident.





## **DEPARTMENT TRAINING**





Chief James Hart and the members of the Loves Park Fire Department believe that training is the backbone of a successful and efficient fire department. The purpose of the Training Division is to enhance our skills to an essential level to provide the best care possible for the citizens of Loves Park as well as the surrounding area. This is obtained by providing purposeful, and up-to-date training opportunities to best fit the situations that may encountered when responding be to emergencies. The Training Division is responsible for developing, and distributing training to our members. The Company Officers ensure that trainings are completed by each of their members daily.

Our department utilizes records а software management program called VectorSolutions to record and track assigned training for the year. The monthly training is developed and entered into the software to ensure compliance with the Insurance Service Office (ISO) training standards. An ISO training credential is assigned annually to department members based on each individual's job classification for the calendar year. There is a minimum of 240 hours of annual training assigned to the credential. These hours are further broken down into the following categories:

- Company Training Hours: 192
- Facilities Training: 18
- Officer Training: 12
- Driver Training: 12
- Hazardous Material Training: 6

This ISO training credential is strictly related to firefighting activities. Department personnel also participate in monthly Emergency Medical Services (EMS) training. Additionally, various personnel train in areas such as vehicle and machinery extrication, active shooter response, and surface water and ice rescue.


## **COMMUNITY RISK REDUCTION**



This year, our department turned part of our focus outward toward our community to reduce identified risks. The community risk reduction program is a part of our fire prevention and inspections bureau that focuses specifically on identifying risks throughout the community. Risk is defined as anything that could pose a real or potential threat to life or property. We can identify a risk by utilizing response data, census data, and actual knowledge of a real or potential risk. After the risk is identified, the real work begins. Our community risk reduction team, comprised of our Captain of Inspections and Prevention, the Deputy Chief of Operations, and the Fire Chief, get to work brainstorming ways to mitigate, reduce, or resolve the risk. After a plan is developed, we work diligently with community members/stakeholders, city officials, other city departments, local relief organizations, etc. to fully implement the plan.

#### 2023 Community Risk Reduction Projects

Household Smoke Alarms



American Red Cross

We have partnered with The American Red Cross to aid us in eliminating this risk throughout the community. The American Red Cross provides our department with new smoke alarms and we install them in households throughout our community that are in need.

Citizens who need smoke alarms are encouraged to call our Fire Inspections and Prevention Bureau at 815-654-5049 to schedule an appointment. During this appointment, we will conduct a home safety survey, identifying any fire and life safety risks within your home, discussing our findings and ways to eliminate risks, and installing the new smoke alarm(s).

• Forest Hills Village- Lack of Adequate Fire Hydrants

In the spring we identified that several of the fire hydrants within the Forest Hills Village neighborhood were not capable of supplying an adequate amount of water for fire suppression, per the National Fire Protection Association's (NFPA) standards. This was because of inadequate water main sizes and an aging water system within the neighborhood. This raised concern, as a significant lack of available water in the event of a large fire would pose a serious threat to property and potentially lives.

Forest Hills Village is a privately owned mobile home community with a private water system. So, we have been working diligently with the owners of the property, the Loves Park Water Department, and the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) to resolve this issue. Forest Hills Village took this concern very seriously, eventually hiring a third party to develop a model that could permanently resolve this issue. Forest Hills Village hired ARC Design to develop a plan to upgrade the water system and install new adequate hydrants that would meet the NFPA standard.

ARC Design has created a plan that provides significant upgrades and that meets the NFPA standards. This plan has been approved by the fire department and the water department and implementation of this plan is hoped to begin in early 2024.

This is a huge victory for the safety of all those who live in Forest Hills Village.

## **PROJECT FIRE BUDDIES**





"Our story -

In December 2016, a young child who was battling cancer fell ill with a high fever. A group of Oak Forest Firefighters answered the 911 call, transporting the child to the hospital for life-saving treatment.

The experience touched our hearts and we wanted to do more to help. So, we reached out to some of the other firefighters at the Oak Forest Fire Department and created Project Fire Buddies.

Project Fire Buddies brings joy to kids struggling with serious illnesses. In our first year, we ran a Christmas toy drive, collecting presents from generous community members and purchasing some themselves, then delivering the gifts to the children's homes. The first responders went big, showing up in shiny fire trucks, police cruisers, and ambulances with sirens blasting and lights shining. No matter what the kids were going through at the time-chemotherapy, radiation, or side effects from their medication and treatments-these visits brightened their day. The smiles were contagious.

Since then, Project Fire Buddies has kept expanding, sponsoring multiple children throughout the year. This year, we're looking to sponsor many more children who could use some good cheer. Our volunteers visit with their fire buddies at home, play games, read books, bring gifts for special occasions, and show the kids just how special they are.

Project Fire Buddies started with the Oak Forest Fire Department, but our ranks keep expanding with new departments set to join in the mission this upcoming year. Visit our Departments page to see if a fire or police department near you is part of the Project Fire Buddies family."

This year our department became the first chapter of Project Fire Buddies outside of the Chicago suburb region. Helping kids during a difficult period of their lives was something we could all get on board with.
